### **Responses from Host Site Facilitators during Facilitator webinar**

Just remember to invite teens!

Ask a teen to be your co-facilitator

Sticky posters on the walls for adults and youth to share ideas.

Make it fun...door prizes/food/ask their opinion

Will engage Jr Leader Council to lead onsite activities.

Door prizes

Have youth there to talk about what they have done and what they would like leaders help them do.

Food/icebreaker have a sundae bar have each participant bring a topping. Compare to sundae to 4-H experience. Being in 4-H is like belonging to 4-H toppings are like the activities and events they participate in.

Ask Conrad to help with ice breakers!

Making Jr. Leaders the hosts for this event: they provide snacks, etc

E-mail blasts and leaders' association meetings encouragement

Junior leaders, as well as club leader and their children

I will use social media to promote the event and invite all club leaders, prospective volunteers, and senior 4-Hers. We will have refreshments and opportunities to share their concerns and needs.

Email invitations

Have them tweet responses.

Involve our 4-H Council youth & adult committee members in the planning.

Our newly elected Junior Leader (7-12 grade leadership club) Officers have been invited to facilitate in pairs as an opportunity to work with our adult volunteers as part of their team building process this fall/winter.

Yes -tech& photography & ice breakers

Maybe they can help with an icebreaker that night

Our 4-H County Council/Teen Senate meets the night of our eForum so they will be in attendance. I like the idea of having them coordinate food and coming up with an ice breaker.

Toss a ball with written questions on it. When a person catches it whatever question is on their thumb is what they have to answer.

Leader letters have been sent out. 4-H Council members will be asked to help.

I hope to have youth there to share what 4-H means to them, how/what they are involved. What they need from a club.

Advertising in county 4-H newsletters and Facebook page.

Sticky posters on the wall for youth and adults to post ideas.

Mix them up for activities.
