

Team Building Time!

ROUND 1:

- Pass around a bag of items to each person. Pull one item out of your bag.
- Now every one stand up and freely move around the room and begin trading items with your neighbors, one at a time.
- The object of the game is to collect all of the same item in your bag (i.e. collect all the Tootsie Rolls) and to give all your other items away to others.
- You can only trade one item at a time give one, receive one.
- Once you have achieved the goal, have a seat.
- Let's see which team can accomplish it first!!

ROUND 2:

- Everyone should have a bag full of the same item (i.e. a bag of rocks, etc).
- Now, stand up and move freely around the room again, beginning to trade items with your neighbors, one at a time.
- The object of the game is to collect one of each item back in your bag and to give away all the other items to others (i.e. you should have 7 different items when done).
- Remain standing until everyone in the group has achieved the goal, then take a seat.
- Let's see which team can accomplish this first!!

QUESTIONS:

- What happened? Were you able to succeed as an individual?
 As a team?
- What did you find challenging about this activity?
- Did team members work out a solution when confronted with a problem or dilemma?
- How was Round 2 different than Round 1?




APPLICATION:

GUIDELINES:

- Huddle up and prepare a brief update on your EYSC project.
- Assign each group member one of the following talking points:
 - 1. Issue the community issue your EYSC team is taking on
 - 2. Big "a-ha" awareness you have built about the issue and the community
 - 3. Partners what groups in the school and community are you working with
 - 4. Milestones what are the 3 biggest things you has accomplished so far
 - 5. Challenges what is the hardest challenge you face
 - 6. Resources what could you use the most right now
 - Next step what is the next thing you are planning to do in 2010 or 2011

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Find the bag with poster board pieces and paper clips.
- Fold and clip the pieces into 7 hollow triangular blocks.
- Now stand up and huddle around the the puzzle.
- The object of the game is for your group to assemble an interconnected structure that resembles the St. Louis Gateway Arch. The Arch must use all 7 pieces and remain free-standing when you are done!



Take the ARCHallenge!


APPLICATION:

- Just like the St. Louis Gateway Arch, a youth-adult partnership requires equal commitment and contributions on the part of youth and adults.
- The "structure" cannot stand unless both sides are leaning toward the other and contributing to the goal.
- The end result is a stronger group that can accomplish more than either could do alone!
- Discuss how your EYSC team is like an ARCH:
 - What are your strong points as a team?
 - Where could things be stronger?
 - Is the partnership balanced between youth and adults?
 - Are any adjustments needed?
